Introductions and review of minutes	There were no changes to the minutes.		
Denver Jameson, MPH Epidemiologist Durham County Dept. of Public Health	<p>Denver has been working with Duke Health and NC DETECT to improve the quality of Durham County opioid overdose data. Many Emergency Department (ED) visits in Duke Health have missing diagnostic codes and chief complaints or contain non-specific codes. There are twice as many missing diagnostic codes in the records as other counties.</p> <p>Denver is reviewing more than 500 records by hand to see if she can determine which cases are overdoses.</p> <p>The Duke Health Emergency Department is working with the Compliance Office to determine ways to share data with the health department. Emergency Medical Services (EMS) data cannot be used because they use naloxone for other reasons besides overdoses. Denver does not have updated data because of the challenges but will continue to try to resolve the issues.</p> <p>Denver has disaggregated data but is not accurate. She will share the data she has with a disclaimer listed.</p>		Denver will give Cindy information about data sharing challenges to share with the Duke Health opioid safety task force.
Robert Thomas, Recovery Community of Durham, NC	The state held a recovery summit in March to increase awareness and share information on status of efforts across the state. The state tasked counties with holding regional summits.	Make sure there is someone in recovery at each of the discussion tables.	

	<p>The regional summit will be held November 28, 8:30 am to 5:00 pm in the Human Services building. The region includes 12 counties in the area including Orange, Person, Vance, Warren, Alamance, Chatham, Wake, Cumberland, Johnston and Durham.</p> <p>The audience are providers, nonprofits, policy makers, clergy, drug courts, law enforcement and consumers. Anyone who impacts the system of recovery at any point. The purpose is to develop solutions and working groups to move things forward. It is expected this meeting will happen annually.</p> <p>Bob would like committee members to serve as facilitators at table discussions and suggest the names of attendees to invite.</p> <p>The meeting will have speakers regarding the issues, current status, discussion groups and a report back. The afternoon will have more speakers and developing solutions for issues identified. Work groups would be assigned based on volunteers to move ideas forward.</p> <p>The Recovery Celebration will take place on September 30 at Durham Central Park.</p>	<p>Allow those in recovery to have a significant role at the meeting so their voices are heard.</p> <p>Share information with the committee about recovery and opioid related town halls, meetings and events for Marissa to send out.</p>	
<p>Carolyn Crowder, <i>Lincoln Community Health Center</i></p>	<p>Lincoln Community Health Center (LCHC) is a safety net clinic for the uninsured and underinsured. Proof of income is required for new patients and needed at time of appointment. Proof of no income is required as well. Income information must be updated annually. Each patient has to pay a co-pay for services depending on insurance. If the patient has no income, they the co-pay will be based on a sliding fee scale. The minimum paid will be at least \$20. Medications for the uninsured are based on a sliding fee scale and the prescription has to be from a LCHC provider. They also have medicated assisted therapy for those with opioid addiction.</p>		

	<p>LCHC has satellite clinics and a variety of services. Carolyn is a counselor and can help patients navigate the health system.</p> <p>LCHC received a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) grant to reduce the number of overdoses and increase primary care among those with addictions. They are also a drug court partner.</p>

<p>Announcements</p>	<p>Starting in June at Recity, Durham TRY will hold community conversations around substance use using the State of the County Health Report (SOTCH) and Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) data to increase capacity to get more parents and youth involved.</p> <p>The North Carolina Division of Public Health is hosting an Opioid Misuse and Overdose Prevention Summit on June 27-28 at the McKimmon Center in Raleigh.</p> <p>The Poe Center and North Carolina Medical Society Alliance is holding a series of Opioid Epidemic Uncovered events September 13-15 in Cary, Greensboro and Raleigh.
