Educational Tools	concern has been for the elderly population finding housing. Brian sees value in	
All	developing a one-page educational tool demonstrating how to manage housing related stress. This tool would focus on making plan of action instead of going into a state of panic about housing. Tools would be for the community at large but would be concentrated on the elderly population.	
	Brian and Kearston Ingraham discussed strategies to improve the public's knowledge of radon and lead testing. One idea is to develop magnets with information on signs of lead, mold and radon along with resources for testing.	
	Collaborating with partners on this project is ideal. PEACH and Reinvestment Partners have initiatives to improve housing, specifically with lead. Committee members will invite those partners to the table.	
	This group will collaborate with the Communications committee to develop a communication strategy and to design the magnets in English and Spanish. Parts of the communication strategy will include posting information in places where people congregate instead of printing flyers. Angier Flea Market, Lincoln Community Health Center, and El Centro are good places to reach community members.	
	The idea is to develop magnets for each issue, potentially focused on the intersections of health and housing. We can work with PEACH on this project and identify areas more prone to high levels of lead in Durham.	

	We can work with Kearston to get data on lead and radon. See if Kearston has a specific group she works with on radon. See how we can help with the work they are already doing. Invite Kearston (lead), PEACH, and Communities in Partnership- prioritize inviting them to the table next meeting. The State has the North Carolina Radon Program. They have provided free testing kits. North Carolina Radon Program NCDHHS
