Lease to Home in Wake County- a landlord outreach program to incentivize landlords to take vouchers.

There are issues with health hazards in housing for immigrants or refugees coming to this area. James Davis will give us updates at the next meeting.

Durham County Sustainability office was awarded a \$1.5 million grant to do energy efficiency for low-income homes in Durham, Orange, and Granville Counties. They will focus on neighborhoods and build in workshops for DIYs people can do. This will be for renters and home owners. They are also working with mobile homes and manufactured homes. They, however, can't do apartments but people who live in apartments could participate in workshops. Workshops will include behavior changes, education, and projects. They don't have data on houses that need repairs but they do have data on the ages of houses. They have not yet selected any houses. A percentage of the funding must go towards particular census groups. https://www.energy.gov/diversity/justice40-initiative

- Durham has an extensive list of neighborhood associations. The Interneighborhood council may be a good way to connect with the neighborhoods directly. Angel can share the contact information if needed.
- Is there a component specifically covering landlord engagement? There is space for engagement and landlords would be a part of that. At the last meeting, we discussed reaching landlords and sharing that there is opportunity to make renovations for disabled folks.

Solarize the Triangle- they got funding from the city and county to install solar panels on low-income homes.

- What disability rights organizations and organizing groups do we need to talk to about this issue?
- Who else in Durham is working on this issue?
- In Durham, how many people with disabilities are living in housing that does not meet their needs for accessibility?
- How do we contact landlords and get them into conversation?
- Are we considering ADA the standard or the bare minimum?
- What are the status of the landlord roundtable?
- How are we defining accessibility?
- Is there some way to mediate before legal aid gets involved?

- How aware is the community on housing vouchers?
- Who is doing work on indoor air quality, specifically CO?
- Can we pay those most impacted to be involved in planning the symposium and impact?
- How can commercial landlords/luxury apartments be brought into the conversation?
- How can we do better than the minimum that the ADA requires?
- How is the city preparing for the growth in the number of older adults (65+)?
- What is the takeaway from the symposium? What will this committee do to follow uptake action?
- What is the process for individuals with Housing Choice/Section 8 vouchers to find and secure housing in our area?
- Are there any barriers, such as discrimination, that voucher holders commonly face when trying to rent from private landlords?
- What incentives or support systems are available for landlords to encourage them to
- Are tenants with disabilities aware of their rights and the available resources to help them find accessible housing and make necessary modifications?
- Are there educational programs or resources available to inform both tenants and landlords about their rights and responsibilities
- What local organizations, advocacy groups, or governmental agencies are available to provide support and guidance to individuals with disabilities seeking rental housing or to landlords dealing with accessibility and modification issues?

Many of these questions overlap with questions that the (Physical Activity, Nutrition, and Food Access) PANFA committee has. Please join the PANFA committee meeting tomorrow at 9 to discuss those intersections.
