Listening session question: If you run out of, or worry you'll run out of food, before you have money to buy more, what do you do? "Start rationing" Gotta look for Food Banks Call parents. "I call my son" cuz he got, he helps with the church and they have food banks and they help Bethel Family Worship Center. They give out food from the food bank. I have turned into food banks several times. Son, we have medical conditions and foods we cannot eat. Canned foods, "before I eat the wrong foods" It's making me unhealthy. Toolkit for Closing the Gaps – Getting to the Root - 5 whys Najla

Problem statement: Why do 16.9% of Durham residents worry that their food will run out before they can buy more?

Participants posted their answers using Jamboard and grouped them in the categories below.

Fear of asking for help/mutual aid and trusting the system

- food isn't a guaranteed right in Durham?
- Fear of asking for help

Inadequate resources or no knowledge of resources

- "lack" of information on resources; information not reaching folks
- Family budget management, how to budget and prioritize.
- Unaware of benefits they are eligible for
- Lack of coordination among food pantries/hunger relief organizations
- Limited access/transportation to get more when needed
- Eligibility requirements for SNAP, WIC, maybe misinformation
- Limited resources and access to free/reduced costs food opportunities, mutual aid

High cost of living/low wages

- Because they are stretching their limited incomes to cover other life necessities such as rent, utilities and care for other family members
- High cost of living
- Low salary, not enough income to pay for food
- Cost of groceries and increase in fast food prices
- They have limited income and are already stretched thin financially
- Low salary, not enough income to pay for food
- Low wages and inflation of grocery prices

Participants went through the decision-making process and focused on: Why is there a cost of living coupled with low wages in Durham?
